

PRESIDENT – Terry O'Donnell Parsons

Last summer, I began my term worried about the future of IWA. Many wonderful women have volunteered with IWA over the decades, but IWA membership had shrunk as the world changed. In a Bucharest where every expat can find fellow nationals with a simple click on Facebook, IWA was no longer the place where everyone gathered by default. In order for IWA to not only survive, but also thrive, our primary goal had to be increasing membership among new arrivals and long-term residents. Therefore, we had to make changes.

I am very happy to announce that since September, our membership numbers have steadily grown until they are now 50% more than they were last year. Hooray!

At last year's General Assembly, IWA voted for a reduced membership fee. This has been a huge help in attracting members. It also meant we had to reduce some of our expenditures. We have continued to expand our use of our website and we've printed fewer newsletters. Most of our members are happy with this change, because it allows us to be up-to-date and "green." For those that are still learning how to use the website, we will continue to offer support.

Coffee Mornings have seen some of the biggest changes from previous years. Our September Coffee was a hugely successful kick-off to our membership drive. As the year progressed, we started asking everyone to pay in order to cover the cost of the venue/coffee. This is standard practice in many other international women's groups. Beginning in May, we plan to charge a set fee of 30 RON for our Coffees - which will still require IWA to subsidize the costs. We also will continue requesting registration for coffees, because venues like to know in advance how much food to prepare. Another change was the result of our survey last year, where members overwhelming indicated that they prefer to alternate locations. This year we ended up changing venues more than we had initially hoped, because we were not able to find a semi-permanent home that met our needs. We did, however, have our monthly Coffees in some wonderful spots. Though a few members complained, most ladies were quite happy with the variety. This coming year, we are happy to announce that we will have a new home for our Coffees on a semi-regular basis, while still exploring new places during the months in-between.

Our charity Christmas Bazaar was a success, thanks to

the hard work of Marina Coanda Bundac and our team. I wish to give a huge hug to Marina, to our Honorary Chair Adriana Ivama Brummell, to all the ladies on the Board who worked so hard, and to all of our Country Coordinators. We truly appreciate the support of all of our business and diplomatic sponsors, because the money raised helps improve the lives of those around us. As an organization, we should be very proud of donating the Verajet machine to Military Hospital, which is being used to provide ongoing treatment to survivors of the Colectiv tragedy, and will help many residents of Bucharest in years to come. In addition, I wish to thank all of the women who work with the Charity Committee, who continue to visit non-governmental organizations and find the best uses for our grants. I wish to remind all IWA members that all charity money is raised and spent separately from our general funds.

As a legal association, IWA is required to register our officers, maintain an office, submit our financial reports and more. I thank Christian Stanculescu and the entire group at Optim, as well as the accounting firm KPMG and the law firm Biris Goran, for their assistance.

You may have heard me say that I almost quit IWA at the end of my first year in Bucharest. I'm so glad that I didn't – the friendships I have made with Romanians and women from around the world are wonderful. I encourage you all to become more active participants in IWA, so that we can grow a vibrant group that will enrich all of our time here.

The Christmas Bazaar was again a big success and I am proud being part of this wonderful event that raised funds for charity, together with Optim Group and the amazing volunteers from Alpha Bank who are participating in our Bazaar every year.

BOARD REPORT

CHARITY – Dana Abi Chahine

I am starting with an applause and congratulations to all the members of IWA, but especially to the charity comittee volunteers! Without your support and dedication none of the activities/grants below would have been possible!

I'm still finding difficult to believe how quickly time has passed, it is almost a year now since I volunteered to chair the IWA Charity activity. But yet, so many wonderful accomplishments this team has made! I'm so proud of everything this little team has succeeded, even if sometimes we had also difficult times. But these accomplishments – and they are not little nor insignificant – are made with love and dedication and most of all time and big hearts!

At the IWA Christmas Bazar 2015, our biggest charity fundraising event, **IWA's net charity income was 121,443.41 RON.** And besides this, the following NGOs present this year at the Bazar together took home aprox 11,000 RON: Asociatia Datini Educatie Cultura-Gaujani, Asociatia Fecioara Maria a Milostivirii (Our Lady of Mercy in Romania), Asociatia Help The People, Chance for Life, Daruiesteviata, Fundatia Mereu Aproape, Health Aid Romania, Hospice Casa Sperantei Foundation, Nightingales Children's Project Romania, P.A.V.E.L, Second Chance Romania, Verita. It is also important to know that there were donations of leftover goods and food from the day going to Usa Deschisa (Open Door Foundation) and Nightingales in Cernavoda.

The IWA Charity Committee and Board have supported post-Colectiv needs by purchasing a Verajet machine for Militar Hospital. We continue to look for an appropriate way to support refugees in Romania, and of course the Charity Committee is receiving applications monthly from a variety of NGOs.

As you all know, IWA Bucharest is still a little Women's Organization but very big in its Heart! We are all very proud. If we look back at the interesting moments and activities which took place so far both within our coffee mornings where we made new nice friends, as well as part of a rewarding and pleasing feeling involving charity activities. For those of you who haven't been yet to Charity Committee — we kindly invite you to join! We are all Volunteers here and Volunteers don't necessarily have the time, but do have the Heart! I strongly believe it!

We began out term following and closing projects at NGOs funded by the previous Board:

- Fundatia Sfanta Irina works to improve the quality of Cancer patients. www.sfantairina.ro
- Fundatia Second Chance works to ensure the improvement of quality life for disadvantaged community from Berceni Village. www.secondchanceromania.ro
- Hospice Casa Sperantei develops palliative care services for patients with life-limiting and terminal diseases. www.hospice.ro
- Asociatia Datini Educatie Cultura Gaujani, a community development program, working on cultural heritage. www.facebook/asociatiadatinigaujani
- Concordia Proiecte Sociale Romania has many projects helping integrating children and young who are living on the streets in Bucharest. www.concordia.ro

We funded new projects:

- Touched Romania offers is a shelter which offers at risk mothers a place to live with their children for a limited period of time and offers them support and training. IWA granted aprox 20.000 Ron for building repair. www.touchedromania.org

- Asociatia Free, which helps sexually exploited women and children. 


Mariana Villanueva

The Secret Police Tracked my Childhood

The Securitate was well acquainted with my parents. My father, in his 20s, found himself in terrible prisons at Jilava and Deva and at the Great Island of Braila labour camp. where he met some of the political dissidents who were systematically tortured there. In July 1964, my father and his friends were liberated in a general amnesty but the Securitate followed his every move, looking for any reason to discredit him and throw him back in prison. Suffocated and intimidated, in February 1965 dad bought a compass, binoculars, antibiotics, a few vials of caffeine, some cans of sardines, and a roll of salami. He made a heart-stopping escape from Romania in a blizzard. Dodging police and hiding in haystacks, they made it all the way to the Iron Curtain at the Bulgarian-Turkish border. The patrol squad showered them with bullets in no-man's land, just 400m from freedom, and sent them back to Romania. My father was sentenced to 11 years at the harshest prison of all, Aiud.

Part of the sentence was a five-month period of torture by solitary confinement and starvation while wearing 45kg of chains day and night, in the "special" wing of the prison at Alba Iulia. My father's own account of this period is hair-raising: he was fed once every two days, and allowed to wash three times in the entire period he was held there.

But, as dad puts it, there was an angel looking after him - he was transferred back to Aiud and freed in January 1969 as a result of changes to the penal code. Dad now attempted to live a normal life. He married and had children. Things didn't seem so bad on the surface. We had summer holidays on the Black Sea and built a lovely house in our village, Draganesti, near Galati, in eastern Romania.

But behind the scenes the Securitate pushed him to breaking point, following and spying on him. My mother, Mioara, was denied a career in teaching because she married a "political agitator" and was therefore likely to "pollute the minds of the younger generation". Told to choose between job and husband, she opted for the marriage, and they both began working in a grocer's shop.

By 1981, however, there were not many groceries to sell. Hungry factory workers yelled at them: "What am I going to put in my bag for lunch?" Evening bread

queues often ended in fistfights. When the doors closed for the day, my father's angry outbursts at the back of the shop mingled with blasts of Radio Free Europe. One day he told my mother: "I don't want to spend my life just breathing air, and doing nothing."

They bought two typewriters, one of which they did not register with the police, and began making anti-communist flyers protesting against shortages and human rights abuses. They spent the nights typing and driving all over the country to put them in people's letterboxes, while my sister and I slept. The police kept coming to the house to check the prints of the legal typewriter, and to see whether they matched with the letters.

On 10 March 1983, my father took to the streets of Bucharest. On top of our red Dacia car, he mounted placards demanding human rights, and denouncing Ceausescu as a torturer who should be put on trial. Then he drove through the city centre, throwing leaflets from the window and blowing a whistle to attract attention. He had said nothing to my mother. She was in the hospital with Catalin, who was close to dying from an untreated lung infection. My younger sister Loredana was away at gymnastics school and I was at home, aged 12, with my grandmother.

This marked the beginning of hell for us.

WOMEN, SPRING AND ROMANIA

Women are paradoxical beings: they are beautiful, graceful, and delicate, they seem weak but they prove to be strong, resilient, and flexible. They are like a bamboo tree which bends but does not break. They are devoted, oriented towards the others, committed, tolerant. They concentrate on relationships. They build roots and structures and offer unconditional love. They have so many roles that every woman is not an individual, but a multitude.

Well, Romania is a woman too. In fact the earth is a woman – Terra Mater – Mother Earth. There are many ancient artifacts found on the Romanian territory representing her. Spring and women go together well, and before Romans changed the calendar in 153 B.C, people celebrated the beginning of the year in spring, the time of the year when nature renews itself.



In Romania we start this celebration in March. On the first of March, Martisor, women receive a small object tied with red and white threads, representing winter and spring.

After winter we need a lucky charm to protect us in a season of changes. Women wear the Martisor throughout the month of March and then hang it on a fruit tree. Weather in March is unpredictable and a Romanian legend says that there are 9 days governed by Baba Dochia, an old woman with 9 winter overcoats. She wants to keep winter, while her daughter-in-law wants to bring spring. In order to know how our year will be, we pick one day between 1-9 March, and depending on the weather of the chosen day we will know how our year will be. On the 9th of March women prepare a special desert called macinici or mucenici. We prepare flour dough in the shape of the figure eight or the sign of infinite. We boil the 'infinites' (aren't we philosophers?), adding crushed nuts and sugar. The same day people in the villages celebrate the fufuliga. They will make fires and jump over them. This is a purification ritual that is a reminiscence of the New Year, and it celebrates the victory of light over darkness.

We should be more aware about feminine sacredness and her myths. If you would like to know more about this subject you can read Mircea Eliade, a famous Romanian historian of religion, fiction writer, philosopher and professor at the University of Chicago.

The traditional Romanian blouse is called an "ie" and for the spring celebrations, each woman had to sew a new one. How beautiful and perfect they are! Romanian peasant women are creative. And no matter how difficult it is for us in modern life, we should be creative and discover our own way, as this is one of our assets.

I will tell you a joke about our nice lady – Romania: God and Saint Peter, who appear in many of our stories, discuss different countries. Saint Peter says to God that He has given too many nice things to Romania. And God answers, "Wait and see what leaders I will give her."

Women also should be careful about what leaders they choose – no matter if we have in mind husbands, administration or government leaders. Maybe we ourselves should become leaders.

I have lived a part of my life during communism, when nobody had rights. Now, I belong to a group of citizens who defend the park in our district against the mafia who cut trees without legal papers and started building in a green space helped by the corrupted administration. The leader of the group is a woman, Nina lancu. We have 5 cases in court and until now we succeeded to suspend the construction work the leader of the group is a woman. If during communist times somebody had told me that one day we would receive an award for civic participation for our fight against the corrupt administration, and that this event would take place in the Parliament built by Ceausescu, I would have said this is crazy. But as you can see Romania, our nice lady, is changing.

I was born in a small village near Bucharest and my grandmother was a wise woman. When she died we

found out about a very ancient custom. The village women brought her white gloves, because they said that the hands of the person who brings newborns to life deserve white gloves in the other world. But I think you deserve white gloves in this world for all the things you do for the others. I am offering them to you all.

ROMANIAN ORTHODOX EASTER



Romanian Orthodox Easter is observed this year on the 1st of May, while the Catholic Easter was held on the 27th of March.

Orthodox Romanian religion, observes the rule established in 325 AC by the Council of Nicaea. Easter, would be held on the first Sunday after the first full moon occurring on or after the March equinox.

On Easter eve people go to church for the midnight service, which is held in the open air. A huge number of people will attend this service even if they are not regular church goers.

People will sing together with the priests and they will light their candles. It's a lovely night as everyone will try to keep the candles lit until they get home, so that their house will receive the Easter blessing. That's the only night during the whole year when you can see lit candles everywhere and the streets will be full. Buses and the metro will function throughout the night.

This is a family celebration and some of the people will have a midnight late dinner. Others will wait until the morning to receive the blessed bread called 'paste' at



the end of the service, which will finish at dawn and then have a family lunch.

In every house you will find traditional Easter dishes. First, there will be the painted eggs and before the meal, family and friends will knock the eggs – a funny competition

started by the eldest member. The person who hits first will say "Hristos a inviat" (Christ has resurrected) and the other will answer "Adevarat a inviat" (He has truly resurrected). The two sentences will replace the normal greetings for forty days, until the 'Inaltare' (Ascension Day).

Long ago the winner collected all the broken eggs but nowadays this custom disappeared.

Lamb is the traditional meat and it is prepared in different ways:

- "drob", made of ground lamb liver, eggs, parsley and green onion
- lamb sour soup with 'bors ' (traditional fermented liquid added to soups)
- 'stufat', a delicious meat dish improved with tons of fresh spring green onion and garlic.
- 'chiftelute' (meat balls)

And for desert, "cozonac", a kind of panetone and "pasca", a cozonac with fresh cottage cheese and raisins. As for drinks we have 'tuica', a plum brandy at the beginning of the meal, or 'palinca', a Transylvanian double distilled tuica. Both open our appetite and make us speak against our will and louder than we want. During the meal wine is served.

In villages the tradition is still kept and children and teenagers should have new clothes. Food is first given to neighbors and friends for the soul of dead people and then families eat together.

In my grandparents village people will have a traditional rice and fish meal, with home made bread and red wine, on

Sunday morning in the yard of the church.

SUMMER ACTIVITIES



As the Chief Travel Artisan at the 5 Senses Romania travel agency, I keep wandering all around the country to discover the most thrilling and authentic Romanian destinations. Romania is a country of many superlatives and I can't ever decide upon a favorite season to travel, but this time I'm compromising on some of the loveliest summertime destinations adding a bit of flavorsome traveling magic.

The magic of the perfect getaway;

Whether you're new to Romania, a laid back sightseer or maybe you're having friends coming over, Prahova Valley seems to have all the right travel answers: the gorgeous king's summer retreat by its name Sinaia, Peleş Castle included, the Royal Winery in Azuga (great for sparkling wine tasting and professional cellar tour), culminating in a genuine revelation of the Dracula legacy at the Bran Castle. In case you're planning a single day escapade, you might be considering the less known but delightful and posh Cantacuzino Castle in Buşteni. At the foot of

the Zamora Mountain this Neo-Romanian style castle was built in 1911. The impressive architecture and the wide domain are completed by the chic terrace facing the city and the blue mountains in a picture perfect summer day. There were three main things that made me fall in love with the castle: the breathtaking view, the elegant interiors and on top of it,



the exquisite Canta Cuisine restaurant. There is no one without the other therefore my recommendation would be to start with one of the hourly castle tours – English tours available upon prior request – then relax for a tasty meal on the terrace (weather permitting) or inside the cozy restaurant. The castle doesn't have any lodging facilities; however, if you already plan to spend the night in Buşteni or Sinaia, you might be interested in the recurrent art exhibitions and the cultural events such as the Moscow's

Bolshoi Theater Classic Nights.



The magic of Brâncuşi and piedmont Oltenia. I must admit in all my traveling years, I have never seen such a splendid display of the sky as I enjoyed during my seasonal trips to Oltenia, home of master Constantin Brâncuşi. You should begin your journey of discovery with a stop at the public gardens of TârguJiu, the place

chosen to host this unique open air exhibition: "The Gate of the Kiss", "The Chairs Alley", "The Table of Silence" and "The Endless Column". A trip to TârguJiu and the small village of Hobiţa, the sculptor's birthplace, is quite

meaningless without exploring the core inspiration of Brâncuşi's art: the mountain landscape. Imagine that he grew up at the foot of the Southern Carpathians, in an area that to the present day cherishes the last unaltered old-

growth forests in Europe, such as those found in the Retezat massif and the Domogled-Cerna River Valley National Park. Brâncuşi Sculptural Ensemble in TârguJiu is part of the public gardens in the city center – free



access, always open; however, there is an admission fee at the Constantin Brâncuşi Memorial House in Hobiţa and it would be best if you planned your visit ahead. Hiking and trekking in any of the National Parks (Retezat or Domogled-Cerna) is usually at tourists' own convenience, but I highly recommend hiring a local ranger, not only for the extra safety, but also for the firsthand information. In each location good value accommodation is available. Horezu: pottery magic and more (plus two extra travel tips)

Among other wonderful things, Horezu is best known locally and abroad as the core of traditional pottery. The artisan potters organize year round workshops welcoming travelers (especially children) to take a seat behind the potter's wheel and turn their creativity loose. Do not miss Cocoşul de Hurez international pottery festival celebrated during the first week of June. While in Horezu, you should also visit the Hurezi Monastery, built in the late 17th century, now part of the UNESCO World Heritage. It is a wonderful display of the Brâncovenesc



architectural style, also called the Romanian Renaissance. If the Retezat Massif is a bit too much for your taste, Buila-Vânturariţa National Park and the Transalpina road are by far the cyclist heaven for the aficionados.

In case you're curious about the life in Romania by the end of the 19th century, you should find the Nicolae Bălcescu Manor most interesting as this time capsule is one of the perfectly preserved, full access museums of the country. Of course, no summer holiday would be complete without a trip to our very own replica of the Tuscan hills, the Vineyards Hill of Drăgășani. Seven renowned wineries are waiting you for guided tours and laid-back wine tasting activities, a lavish experience to brag about.
