

PRESIDENT'S REPORT Terry O'Donnell Parsons

When I look back on these last 2 years as IWA President, it is the people who are most important to me. The talented, hard working, generous, and kind women on the Board amazed me and made my job joyful! I have met so many other lovely and impressive women, from Romania and around the world, and from all walks of life, that it has been a true pleasure to serve as IWA President.

When I first became President, I worried that IWA would die on my watch, because membership had been declining steadily down to 92 members. We have a couple of long-time members who lament that IWA has changed over time, but the association must stay modern in order to survive and thrive.

I remind you again that:

- The Board recommends and feels strongly that we should maintain our membership fee at 300 RON, and continue to charge a fee for monthly coffee mornings
- Charity funds are raised and spent separately from our admin funds
- Your membership fee supports room rental for coffee mornings, our website, magazine, accounting services and much more
- Our activities vary in cost and type, and are offered in response to member interests.... if you would like to see something else, please volunteer to help us get it started

International women's clubs are an invaluable resource to expats and returning nationals and I am very happy that we have breathed new life into IWA. I am proud of our website, and our impressive range of activities. I appreciate our renewed connections with the Ambassadors and their spouses, who give us such invaluable support during our multicultural charity fundraiser, the Christmas Bazaar. It's wonderful that we are able to offer grants to some of the many outstanding charity organizations in the Bucharest area, improving the lives of those around us who are less fortunate.

Our Board members have occasionally had long, stressful days, but we have always been a good team. Ximena, Maria, Carmen and I have worked hard behind the scenes, together with our auditors and accountants and lawyers, to ensure IWA is a strong and stable association. Many of the proposed changes to IWA Statutes this year are simple "housekeeping;" cleaning up the document with the help of IWA's lawyer. The most important change to

me is to formally recognize job sharing, by the creation of Deputy positions, because our volunteers are all busy women with full lives, and we need teams to be able to continue IWA's work.

Please remember that IWA needs:

- YOU to plan an occasional activity, to volunteer for the Bazaar and special projects
- YOUR FRIENDS & COLLEAGUES –recruit new members to keep IWA growing & strong!
- KINDNESS towards all of the women freely volunteering their time and effort on the Board and elsewhere in IWA, and a warm greeting to those members you haven't had a chance to get to know yet

Thank you to all those who've wished I could stay on as President again, but I confess I think having "term limits" is a good thing. It gives new people the chance to come in with new ideas and energy. Still, having worked tremendously hard over the last 2 ½ years, I am happy for the opportunity to continue in a more limited role as part of the membership team.

1ST VICE PRESIDENT'S REPORT Maria Raets Musat

On my second year on the Board I accepted the challenging role of 1st Vice President. While it may have been a challenging experience, it was followed by great accomplishments for our association.

The Board decided to separate ourselves from Optim Group, who was leasing our legal space and keeping our books. Within a few months, working with the President, 2nd Vice President and Treasurer, we found a new accountant, a new free space, and we managed to transition all the paperwork. We have been through a couple of tough months. We have had a lot of administrative tasks, but it only proved that we could work together as a team and make important decisions.

My second big challenge was coordinating the sponsorship for the Christmas Bazaar 2016. I contacted and raised money from different institutional sponsors (old and new) and coordinated the sponsorship contracts for all the countries involved in the Bazaar. IWA raised 20% more money this year than last year. This fills our hearts with joy when we think off all the charities we can give grants to. Together with the 2nd Vice President we managed to secure a semi-permanent location for our coffee mornings held in 2016-2017. The Sheraton Hotel agreed to host us on very generous terms, which helped us keep our budget in place.

Lastly, I helped coordinate a few activities and clubs, encouraged new members to join IWA, took part in all the major decisions the Board made, and helped work towards a more diverse yet united IWA.

2ND VICE PRESIDENT'S REPORT Ximena Reyes

This year some members left to their next destinations, and they will be truly missed. Many of them contributed actively to IWA and we are sure they will be appreciated wherever they go. We are also glad to see new faces in

IWA, and to have nice coffee mornings with interesting presentations and speakers.

This year we concentrated on creating procedures and systems in order to have continuity in our activities. Having a functioning website that can have everything clear and detailed has been of great help. We have received a lot of feedback that this way is appreciated and we have seen the results. Many weeks we have a variety of activities that cater to many interests.

In terms of administration, we made it a priority to ensure that all administrative procedures and documents are up to date. It took extra time, and work with outside professionals, and now our systems are in good shape for future Boards.

Our Christmas Bazaar also had changes behind the scenes, as this year the team worked even harder to comply with safety regulations and make sure we had a nice space with representatives from all corners of the world. We are always humbled by how many people say YES and volunteer or donate goods or their time.

We are all volunteers, we accomplish more by working together and supporting other team members when needed, facilitating meetings, liaising with other institutions and always being good will ambassadors for IWA.

TREASURER'S REPORT Carmen Barta

I am very honored I had the opportunity to be the IWA Treasurer for the second time and I am proud I could share my experience and bring my contribution to the IWA Board 2016-2017.

During this last Term, our previous landlord and accounting firm moved offices a couple of times, and changed staff. The Board decided to move to a new office and hire a new accounting company. IWA is now receiving services from Codruta Sandra Banica, through her company CSB Grup. Sandra is highly recommended, and her lower fee allows us to have savings that we can distribute to other budget items.

We thank KPMG, our pro bono auditors, for their help with the last audit. In order to be more timely, the Board recommends hiring an auditor in the next term.

We are very grateful this year again to Radu Jianu, with Biris Goran, who kindly accepted to do all our legal services pro bono.

As you can see from the financial report, your membership dues enable the IWA Board to pay for a wide variety of services, in order to maintain a great organization. Our charity funds are raised and dispersed separately. The Board recommends that IWA maintain its 300 RON annual membership fee, with half-year membership offered beginning in March, and that members continue to pay for coffees and events.

The Christmas Bazaar 2016 was a big achievement. With the help of Sandra, Alpha Bank, other volunteers, and a couple of amazing IWA members, we managed to go through the day smoothly. The end of the day brought even more joy, we raised more money than the previous year!

Thank you for offering me the opportunity to be part of IWA family and I am looking forward to bringing my contribution further on.

It was decided that half-year membership will not be offered at the beginning of the IWA membership year, which starts like the school year each September.

CHARITY REPORT MARCH 2017

Lise Spriggle

Our 2016-2017 IWA Charity Committee has collaborated with other IWA members to expand ways we help charities beyond just providing funding.

At our Spring 2016 General Assembly meeting, many of our members donated books, kitchen appliances, clothing and children's' items to be given to needy charities. Items were inventoried and distributed to the following charities: Valea Plopului/Valea Screzii, Pro Act Support, Nightingales, Hope for You Shelter, Chance for Life and Fundatia Inocenti. Thank you to the members who brought in valuable items to share with those in need.

Over the last year, a few of our IWA members have donated time on a weekly basis to offer hands on support for medically fragile, elderly and/or impoverished individuals. Some of our members volunteer on a regular basis for local NGO's such as Touched Romania, Our lady of Mercy, Chance for Life, Fundatia Inocenti, and Light into Europe, as well as others.

Please let us know if you would be interested in an opportunity to help others. If you don't have a dedicated time each week, Casa Sperantei hospice is in need of donations of pre-made meals for home bound terminally ill patients on a monthly basis.

During our spring term of 2016 our charity committee finalized visits, gathered approvals and provided grants to 3 NGO's with remaining proceeds from last year's Bazaar:

Nightingales – 24000 RON

Nightingales Children's Project has found a way to provide resources not only for vulnerable individuals, but also to provide a resource for their local community members. Our IWA funded grant assisted with opening a local coffee shop that allows young people at risk for human trafficking a place to gain work experience and marketable skills. In addition, it provides a place for community members to spend time, purchase hand made items and mentor others. IWA Funds were used to purchase kitchen furniture and appliances.

Speranta Pentru Tine/Hope for you – Casa Samariteanul – 13000 RON

This NGO serves two populations of Romanians in need. They offer support to children with terminal illness and

serious medical conditions. They also have a shelter and social reintegration program for indigent individuals. The goal of the shelter is to offer employable skills training for individuals in order for them to become more independent and able to function formal support. The IWA grant helped equip their kitchen and bedroom facilities.

Applied Behavioral Therapy Assoc. (Asociatia de Terapie Comportamentala Aplicata - ATCA) — 9692

ATCA is fortunate to have the first Board Certified Behavior Analyst that specialized in treating children with autistic disorders. Rather than institutionalizing these children, they are offered specialized therapies, socializing activities and communication development in order for them to gain enough skills to be able to function in regular school settings. IWA provided financial assistance towards specialized therapy equipment and technological devices.

Our 2016 annual holiday Bazaar was a huge success. In fact, we actually raised more money than last year. Our total income for our charity fund was 180247 RON. A big thank you to our country coordinators, donors, sponsors, IWA members, and community members for everyone's help. We look forward to next year and trying to surpass this year's revenue. Just a note that this annual fundraiser helps NGO's in both direct and indirect ways. In addition to cash grants from IWA, and donation of unsold goods, the Bazaar provides publicity to causes and charities.

The following NGO's had stands at this year's bazaar: Asociatia Pavel, Freamat de Speranta, Help the People, Ana Si Copii, Fundatia Har, Nightingales, Ateilier Fara Frontiere, Fundatia Mereu Aproape, Organizatia Free, Chance for Life, Help Austism and Verita.

These charities sold items for their own fundraising and the Bazaar allowed exposure and marketing of their products.

Unsold items and perishable goods from country stands were given to the following NGO's for distribution in their centers: Help the People (mentally handicapped adults), Nightingales Cernavoda (prevention of human trafficking), Touched Romania (high-risk babies and their mothers), HAR Bucharest: Health Aid Romania (HIV/AIDS infected children and young adults).

Onward to our current year: 2017. Our committee members are busily coordinating many new incoming grant applications. Our team has been reviewing applications

and scheduling on site visits to provide transparency, accountability, sustainability and ensuring that each organization provides direct benefits. In addition, we are coordinating with a local office that supports asylum seeker/refugees in order to identify ways to help.

We have just approved grants and will soon fund projects at:

Organizatia Suedeza pentru Ajutor Umanitar Individual. Their Mission is to fight for social inclusion of people with disabilities and elderly through services and interventions adapted to their individual needs. They provide therapeutic services, workshops and activities. Funds used to purchase items for therapeutic items to increase individuals functioning.

Asociatia Gradinita Noel. Their aim is to integrate disabled children with mainstream children. Many of the disabled children are not accepted into traditional Romanian schools. This program offers services, therapies and support to allow them to function with other students. IWA grant will purchase furniture and items for children's projects.

Jesuit Refugee Service. Organisation helps provide temporary shelter for those who otherwise would be detained, offers legal support, and medical assistance in many locations. They can support up to 18 asylum seekers at a time at their Bucharest location. Residents stay in containers that are in need of air conditioning and updated kitchen and bathroom fixtures.

Touched Romania is a shelter for women and children who are victims of domestic violence or trafficking. They are in great need of updating kitchen cabinets that are in disrepair and replacing other furniture and bed linens.

White Yellow Cross-Adam Project. This program provides medical rehabilitation services (kinetotherapy, gymnastics, psychological assistance) in clients homes as well as some devices to help their functioning. Grant will be used to purchases rehab devices, technology devices and air conditioning for their space.

Asociatia Help the People, works with handicapped adults to increase their functioning and employability. IWA funds will provide sewing equipment, material and irons.



WOMEN OF BUCHAREST

Profiles of inspiring locals



































Society always valued men more than women and many efforts were made by women to be professionally accepted as equal to men. Romanian women were very brave and determined and fought to make their way in a world of men.

Smaranda Braescu (1897- 1948)

Smaranda Brăescu was a Romanian parachuting and aviation pioneer, multiple world record holder. Her achievements earned her the nickname «Queen of the Heights

She became a European champion for parachute jumping in 1931 at 6000 m. In 1932 she became the world champion at 7400 m and this achievement was improved only with a few meters after

20 years. She was one of the few trainers for military parachute jumpers. During the war was an active pilot in the famous 'White Escadrille 'of sanitary planes. She is one of the 11 personalities who condemned the forged elections in 1946 and she was condemned to prison by the communist. She was hidden by gentle people and she was never found.

Eliza Leonida Zamfirescu (1887 – 1973)

Eliza Leonida Zamfirescu was unanimously recognized as the first woman engineer in the world graduating in 1912. She was also a member of the International University Women Association. She was rejected to study at Bucharest Polytechnics due to the fact she was a woman. In 1909 she went to Berlin and she became the

first woman student of the Royal Technical Academy. The dean Hoffman stressed that the essential duties of woman are the three K – kirche, kinder, kuche (biserica, copii, bucataria). She transformed the prejudices, hostility and the mocking attitude into general admiration and even the dean declared her "Die Fleissigste der Fleissigsten" (cea mai silitoare dintre silitori).

Sarmiza Bilcescu (1867 – 1935)

She was the first Romanian woman lawyer. She was the first European woman who got a degree in law at the University of Paris and the first woman in the world with a PhD. Her doctorate paper was 'The legal condition of mothers'. She was one of the founders of the Society of Romanian Ladies whose aim was to fight to raise the education level of women.



Ana Aslan (1897 -1988)

became famous due to her career in gerontology and she became the director of the first gerontology institute in the world. She created Gerovital H3 to help diseases connected with old age. Another invention together with Elena Polovrageanu was Aslavital. Among



her patients we should mention Charles de Gaulle, Nichita Hrusciov, J.F. Kennedy, Indira Gandhi, Salvador Dali, Iosif Broz Tito, Peron ,Mao Zedong, Winston Churchill, Charlie Chaplin, Marlene Dietrich, Greta Garbo, Konrad Adenauer, the Romanian presidential couple Elena and Nicolae Ceausescu. etc.

Elena Vacarescu, (1864-1947)

Elena Vacarescu had a rich literary activity and studied in Paris. Her poetic activity was directed by the poet Sully Prudhomme. She is the first Romanian woman accepted in the French Academy. King Ferdinand fell in love with her and wanted to marry her but the royal family was against the marriage as she had was not from royal blood.

Living a global life: stories from our members

"SEVEN CITIES" a part of Incredible India

I moved to New Delhi, India in 2010 joining my husband and daughter who arrived a month before me. Moving to another new country, to a new and challenging continent, was in some ways easier than I expected, but once again, I had to reinvent my myself, find where I "fit" and decide, 'I can be happy here.'



I joined Delhi Network, an international/expat group, as well as the American Welcome Association. I spent too much time having my new apartment repaired following a prolonged monsoon. I volunteered in my community; I made new friends and received great advice on how to navigate this new crowded, polluted, chaotic and mesmerizing city.

"Join 7 cities" was one piece of advice repeated many times, so when another newcomer said she was planning to join the group, I signed up with her. The concept is that expats living in Delhi join together to learn about the historic "seven cities" of Delhi by researching and teaching each other. Forty expats are divided into 10 groups, given some guidance and a schedule. Each week, a new group presents its city in its own way (no tour guides or locals allowed).

Assigned to the first & second city, I met Stephanie (British), Janet (Australian) & Juliana (French/Brazilian) and explored our "cities" that encompassed the UNESCO World Heritage monument of Qtab Minar, a sprawling archaeological park, the wall along a cricket stadium and the incredibly crowded and vibrant subcity of Mehrauli. We met at each other's homes to plan how to present and take the rest of the group on a tour of "our city." We prepared a booklet on the history of Lal Kot, hiked through undeveloped 'parks', wandered down narrow streets through markets and neighborhoods to map out our tour.

Each week a new group presented a new city and a new period of history; what fun finding the unique, the mysterious, the hidden and fascinating from the many centuries of Delhi. One group dressed in costume and played roles of the famous rulers of their city. Another served a picnic lunch in the ruins of an ancient fort-complete with linens, flower petals strewn on the stone floor, incensed candles lighting our way on our tour of the fortress. We discovered treasures and important history – sometimes hidden in plain sight- amongst the markets and communities in this city of more than 20 million. We talked, we learned, we explored, we shared information and experiences; we made new friends and we had so much fun. Delhi became our home. On the weekend, we dragged our families out to see each new city we had just explored. We forged a friendship with each other – and a link to everyone else who over the past many years explored Delhi through this unique experience.



THIS YEAR BOTH THE ORTHODOX CHRISTIAN EASTER AND THE CATHOLIC EASTER FALL ON SUNDAY, APRIL16th.

There are two main factors that cause the well-known conflict in dates:

- . the Christian Orthodox Church continues to follow the Julian calendar, which is thirteen days behind the Gregorian calendar when calculating the Pascha (Orthodox Easter Sunday) date.
- . the Orthodox Church still follows the rule established by the First Ecumenical Council, i.e. the Pascha must take place after the Jewish Passover in order to maintain the Biblical sequence of Christ's Passion.

Lent 2017 started on March 1 and will end on April 15. This is the annual period of Christian observance that precedes Easter. Lent starts on Ash Wednesday and lasts for forty days, mirroring the 40 days that Jesus spent fasting in the wilderness. This penitential period involves fasting (giving up meat, cakes, and sweets) and abstinence (refraining from alcohol, smoking, and sexual relations), and it is meant as a time of reflection, prayer, and contemplation.



invented just about everything we hold dear. Greek men shattering plates while dancing is guaranteed to instantly stimulate on our part tapping of feet and vigorously singing: Opa!

It all started on a serious note though, about two thousand years ago, with smashing funerary plates. It was suggested the custom is nothing more than the marketing idea of a pottery merchant. If such is the case, the idea sells to this day and he justly deserves the title for best travelling

salesman of Antiquity. Reportedly, one Greek singer was so taken with the tradition that he would whack plates on his head while performing, to demonstrate the force of his feelings. I would say this is stretching it. Imagine if this catches on and you are faced with a proposal. The beloved drops on one knee, presents the ring and, with one smooth movement, cracks on his forehead the cup held with the other hand. No deal.

RECIPES from our COOKING CLUB

BASIC SCONE By Jean O'Connor



I found this recipe and its variations in Woman's Day magazine. I served them at a recent Stitching Club "meeting." I just got a new pastry dough cutter; although I still need to practice using it – it really helped blend the dough, and we all liked the result.

Ingredients:

- 2 cups flour
- 2 Tbls sugar
- ½ tsp salt
- 6 Tbls cold butter, cut into pieces
- 1 egg
- ½ cup heavy cream (I use 150 g cup of Greek Yogurt
- + 2 tablespoons of almond or soy milk instead)



Preparation:

- 1. Heat oven to 220 C (425 F). Line a baking sheet with parchment.
- 2. In a large bowl, whisk together the flour, sugar, baking powder and salt. Add the butter and using a pastry blender or two knives, cut it in until the mixture forms small crumbs. Make a well in the center of the mixture.

- 3. In a bowl, whisk together the egg and $\frac{1}{2}$ cup heavy cream. Add to the flour mixture and using fork, gently stir until incorporated (do not over mix). Bring the dough together.
- 4. On a lightly floured surface, shape the dough into an 8 in round/1 inch thick. Cut into wedges and place on the baking sheet. Brush tops with the remaining 1 Tbls cream.

Bake until golden brown 12 to 14 minutes.



Variations:

- Cranberry-oat: Prepare recipe as above, but after cutting in the butter, fold in 1 cup (75g) oats, ½ cup (50 g) dried cranberries & and ¼ cup finely chopped crystallized ginger.
- Sour cream & chocolate chip: Prepare as above, but double sugar- 4 Tbls. Cut in the butter, then fold in 1 ¼ cup semisweet chocolate chips (or chop up 100-125 g dark chocolate bar). Replace the ½ cup heavy cream with ¼ sour cream. Continue.
- Orange rosemary scones. Prepare the scones as above. Use a vegetable peeler remove 3 strips of zest from 1 naval orange. Thinly slice the zest. Cut in the butter, then fold in the zest and 1 Tbls fresh rosemary (roughly chopped).



RUBY RED BEET SOUP

From Clean Soups

Ingredients:

- 3 tbsp extra-virgin olive oil
- 1 yellow onion + 1 fennel bulb diced
- 2 stalks celery, diced
- 1 tsp ground cumin + 1 tsp ground coriander
- 1 tsp caraway seeds
- Pinch of red pepper flakes + Sea salt
- 6 cup vegetable or chicken stock
- 8 oz red cabagge chopped
- 3 beets peeled and diced
- 2 tbsp plain yogurth for garnish
- 2 tbsp chopped fresh dill for garnish



Preparation:

- . Heat the olive oil over medium heat.
- . Add the onion, fennel, celery and ½ tsp of salt.
- . Saute till golden, about 6 min.
- . Add cumin, coriander, caraway seeds and red pepper flakes and stir until well combined.
- . Pour $\frac{1}{2}$ of broth to deglazae the pot, and cook till the liquid is reduced by half.
- . Add the cabbage and $1\!\!/_{\!\!4}$ tsp of salt and stir.
- . Add the beets and another 1/4 tsp of salt.
- Stir and cook for about 1 min
- . Add the other $5\frac{1}{2}$ cups of broth and $\frac{1}{2}$ tsp of salt.
- . Bring to a boil, cover and simmer until the beets are tender, about 20 to 30 min.
- In a blender puree the soup in batches until smooth.
- . Serve garnished with youghrt and dill.

SHEPHERD'S PIE

A classic British Gordon Ramsay Recipe

Ingredients for 2:

For the meat : For the potatoes :

Minced lamb/Ground beef Medium sized potatoes 3

Salt/ Pepper Salt, pepper Onion - 1 Eggs - 2

Carrot - 1. Parmesan cheese

Garlic - a few pods

Worcestershire sauce / Soya

sauce

Tomato purée - 3 tbsp

Red wine - 5 tbsp

Thyme Rosemary

Chicken broth - 3 tbsp



Instructions:

Splash some olive oil onto a pan. Fry in the minced lamb/ beef till you get rid of the unwanted fat. Season with salt and pepper. Grate in the onion, carrot and garlic. Mix well. At this stage, pour in a dash of Worcester sauce along with the tomato purée. Mix well. Add the red wine and season with thyme and rosemary. Once the wine has reduced, add the chicken broth. Mix well until the liquid from the wine and stock have reduced completely leaving behind a flavourful mince mix.

Move on to the potatoes, boil and mash them into a smooth paste. Mix in the egg yolks. Once done, add a generous amount of Parmesan cheese. Mix well and keep aside.

In your baking dish, layer in the minced meat prepared. Once done, spread the potato mash on top. Grate cheese as a topping over the potato mash along with a last round of seasoning. Preheat the oven to 180c and bake for about 18 - 20 minutes. Serve hot.
